### **Introduction to the course:**

Sociology is the study of society, large groups of people, and individuals. It explores:

- How and why people behave the way they do in society
- How social structures such as the family and government influence human behaviour
- Human behaviour through the lens of social science, using research to investigate, explain and predict patterns in society
- How such understanding can help improve the lives of citizens

Sociology is a critical and radical subject. It questions why society is the way it is and digs beneath the surface to uncover what's really going on. It is the systematic study of human behaviour within society, which is a complex system. Sociologists adopt different perspectives and research methods based on their theoretical approach to understanding society. This makes Sociology a truly exciting A-level: it is current, political, eye-opening, and even life-changing.

In this subject, we focus particularly on how a person's social position (such as their gender, social class, and ethnicity) can affect their life chances in society. A key part of success in Sociology is learning and using the main ideas, concepts, and specialist terminology - the language of the subject - to analyse and discuss the topics and issues that shape our social world.

### **Course Overview**

We follow the AQA Specification for A-level Sociology. This is a two-year course assessed through three two-hour written exams, each worth 33% of the final A-level grade (A\*-E).

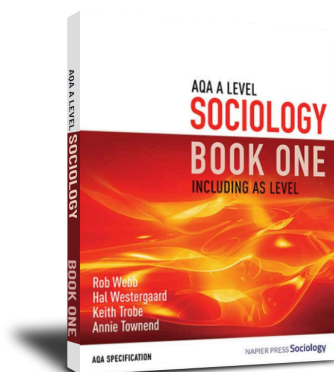

Sociologists seek to answer questions and develop theories about the social world. Their theories usually take the form of explanations of how or why social life follows the patterns that it does. You will need to understand the key theories in sociology:

- Functionalism,
- Marxism,
- Feminist theories
- Action theories.

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**Task:** Briefly summarise each theory in at least two paragraphs, including key ideas and the sociologists involved.

### **3. Research methods - How do sociologists study society?**

**Tasks:**

- Can you find out what is the difference between positivists and interpretivists?

### **4. Education - Why do some groups underachieve in education?**

- Create a table of all the reasons why white working-class boys are failing at school. One column should be headed 'factors inside school' (e.g. interactions with teachers, peer group etc) and the other 'factors outside school' (e.g. poverty at home, wider community).
- To what extent is educational failure among white working-class boys caused mainly by poor parenting? use evidence from The Lost Boys article in your answer.

### **5. Family - How has the family changed over time?**
